

Chaburah Meal

A regular Jewish fellowship meal between members of a covenant family.

Hebrew = Chaburah

Greek = Koinonia

English = Communion

HIGH PRIEST VESTMENTS

Ketonet (tunic)

Made of pure linen, covering the entire body from the neck to the feet, with sleeves reaching to the wrist. The "Ketonet – Tunic" of the High Priest was richly embroidered (Exodus 28:39); those of the regular Priestly cast were plain (Exodus 28:40).

Avnet (sash)

That of the High Priest was of a fine linen with "embroidery work" in blue, purple and scarlet (Exodus 28:39 & 39:29). Those worn by the regular Priestly cast were of white, twined linen.

ALTAR / TABERNACLE

THE ALTAR:

The altar represents the two aspects of the same mystery: The altar of sacrifice and the table of the Lord. (CCC 1383)

"And the Word became flesh and made his dwelling (tabernacled) among us"

INCENSE

INCENSE

BELLS

"All around the hem at the bottom you shall make pomegranates, woven of violet, purple and scarlet yarn and fine linen twined, with gold bells between them; first a gold bell, then a pomegranate, and thus alternating all around the hem of the robe. Aaron shall wear it when ministering, that its tinkling may be heard as he enters and leaves the LORD'S presence in the sanctuary"

(Exodus 28:33-35)

In Biblical times the shofar was blown to announce an important event.

Blowing the Shofar is the only specific commandment for Rosh Hashanah. Just as trumpeters announced the presence of their mortal king, the Shofar is used by Jews to proclaim the coronation of the King of King.

The Body & Senses in Prayer ...

LECTIO DIVINA

An Ancient Method of Praying the Bible Practiced and Taught by Pope St. Gregory the Great (590-604AD)

ZENIT: Pope Benedict XVI believes that the recovery of the practice of "lectio divina," prayerful meditation of Scripture, will bring a "new spiritual springtime" for the Church. When meeting with more than 400 experts attending a congress in Rome on "Sacred Scripture in the Life of the Church," the Holy Father recommended this ancient practice which literally means "divine reading."



Lectio Divina

(An Ancient Method of Prayer in 5 steps)

(*) PREPARE

Get your Bible & Find a quiet place to pray; Plan to pray for at least 15 minutes

(1) LECTIO (Attentive Reading - out loud)

How To Do It:

Select just a few verses; Slowly and quietly read & re-read the verses out loud 2-3 times

(2) MEDITATIO (meditation)

How To Do It:

Watch for your favorite verse or even just a favorite word from the passage!

Put yourself in the bible passage; hear the words; see the colors; feel the gravel; smell the flowers; taste the food

(3) ORATIO (prayer; conversation; speech)

How To Do It:

Tell God about your favorite verse or your favorite word! Tell Him why you like or what it means to you.

(4) CONTEMPLATIO (contemplation; rest in the Lord)

How To Do It:

Now rest silently and open your heart to God.
Listen in silence. Don't worry about
distractions, but gently return from them to
continually focus on God.

(5) OPERATIO (work; effort; activity; action)

How To Do It:

What are small little ways that you can implement what you have received? Plan little ways each day to change your own attitude & actions – maybe in how you treat your family, friends, or neighbors?

John 1:1-14

- In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God.
- All things came to be through him, and without him nothing came to be. What came to be through him was life, and this life was the light of the human race; the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.
